<b>Lochaber Citizens Advice Bureau</b>				<b>£20,845</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£16,959</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£3,886</b>	
<p>This funding would be used to develop support services to migrant workers. Running complementary to their existing pilot the organisation would like to recruit a part-time Project Officer who would recruit and train six volunteers from migrant communities. These volunteers would be empowered to deliver advice and information to their peers. Specialist information and advice materials would be produced in collaboration with migrant workers and these would be used across the CAB services. 100 migrant workers will directly benefit over the two years. The project will also inform CAB Scotland around the development of advice services to this target group.</p>				

<b>Dumfries &amp; Galloway Citizens Advice Service (DAGCAS)</b>				<b>£49,393</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£23,585</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£25,808</b>	
<p>This funding will be used to set up a specific advice and information service for people from ethnic minorities through the employment of a part-time Development Worker. This worker would be charged with engaging with ethnic minorities to assess their needs and the barriers they face in accessing the service, develop an appropriate service, recruit volunteers from ethnic minorities and develop links with other agencies. 250 people will benefit over the lifetime of the funding.</p>				

<b>LINKnet Mentoring Limited</b>				<b>£85,256</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£41,998</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£43,258</b>	
<p>Based in Edinburgh, LINKnet is a mentoring organisation that brings together mainly BME adults and mentors and provides a one-to-one mentoring programme. The funding will be used to develop the organisations work around supporting employment through dedicated mentoring services. This particular project will approach BME students at Colleges and Universities as well as school pupils who are considering leaving school. They will offer mentoring with a mentor from one of a choice of partner organisations with whom the mentee may consider working. School leavers may be offered work or further education mentoring. 75 young people will benefit.</p>				

<b>Eildon Housing</b>				<b>£80,000</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£40,000</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£40,000</b>	
<p>Eildon is a large well established housing association in the Scottish Borders providing a range of social housing and community support. The project will establish a Migrant Workers Support Service providing information and advice to newly arrived migrant workers and developing collaborative work with employers and service providers. A specific forum has been developed to improve the integration of migrant workers. The Eildon Community Initiatives Co-ordinator contributes is driving this project forward in consultation with the other partners, which include Scottish Borders Council, the Police, the NHS, Scottish Enterprise, Borders Race Equalities Group, CVS, and CAB. Up to 700 migrant workers will benefit.</p>				

<b>West of Scotland Racial Equality Council</b>			<b>£5,000</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£5,000</b>		
<p>West of Scotland Racial Equality Council (WSREC) is based in Glasgow and its area of operation is the West of Scotland. It has 110 affiliated organisations and operates with 4 full-time staff and 2 part-time staff as well as volunteers and secondees. They exist to promote equality of opportunity through all walks of life between people of different race and colour and to support victims of racial harassment and discrimination. They currently support projects with Asylum Seekers, an Education Project with statutory agencies around racial equality schemes and their duties, they run a Race Equality Course and operate a training unit. WSREC wish to establish a Criminal Justice System Community Forum. The funding will be utilised to undertake research into how to structure this Forum and then develop it.</p>			

<b>The Council of Ethnic Minority Voluntary Sector Organisations (CEMVO)</b>			<b>£99,701</b>

<p>CEMVO is a national agency working to support and develop the ethnic minority voluntary sector. This exciting proposal will work to change the civic landscape in Scotland through creating “a visible structure for civic engagement.” It has been developed in response to the poor levels of representation from ethnic minorities amongst our current civic leaders. The funding will be used to establish a national Ethnic Minority Civic Parliament consisting of representatives from community groups across Scotland as well as being used to build participative and leadership skills through regional workshops with black and minority ethnic individuals. 50 individuals will benefit from involvement with the Civic Parliament alongside 80 course participants.</p>			

<b>Workers' Educational Association</b>			<b>£12,300</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£6,150</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£6,150</b>
<p>Although a national organisation, this WEA project is based in Inverness and works across the Highland Council area. The funding will be used to develop the activities of an International Women’s Group which works to involve and support women in developing their capacity to contribute to society. The Group is composed of a range of women from different minority ethnic backgrounds. This funding will be used to allow them to develop their integration activities such as training, Diverse Days, work with community based associations and schools etc. 60 women will benefit from across the Highland area.</p>			

<b>PATH (Scotland)</b>			<b>£62,450</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£33,200</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£29,250</b>
<p>PATH uses positive action approaches to overcome the barriers to employment in housing and social work agencies experienced by minority ethnic communities; and provides advice and consultancy to public and voluntary sector organisations. The grant is being utilised to establish a management / leadership programme involving 20 minority ethnic employees from public sector and housing agencies to enable them to overcome disadvantage and compete for promoted positions in the workplace.</p>			

<b>Midlothian Voluntary Action</b>			<b>£785</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£785</b>		
<p>Midlothian Voluntary Action (MVA) chairs the Voluntary Sector Social Inclusion Forum which includes a standing item on equalities issues. This small amount of funding will contribute to the professional development of 15 workers in autonomous groups in order to allow them to be able to support race issues and the tackling of racism. Dedicated training will be offered to 15 organisations from across Midlothian.</p>			

<b>Catholic Church Hall Hawick Users Group</b>			<b>£1,415</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£1415</b>		
<p>The Users Group represents a range of organisations who manage a community based Hall in Hawick. They have identified a need to support a growing population of Polish migrant workers in the town. They will use the funding to run a 'Cross Cultural Exchange Project' which will encourage the integration of migrant workers into the community and support them through the process. Cooking will be used as a tool to encourage sharing of cultures and language development. 30 Polish individuals would benefit from the project initially but the numbers are expected to grow.</p>			

<b>Project Ability</b>			<b>£6,376</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£6,376</b>		
<p>Working across Glasgow, Project Ability use the visual arts as a tool to integrate individuals facing disadvantage and through this to educate the public on disadvantage. Project Ability wish to extend their programmes of work to ethnic minorities – targeting individuals from ethnic minorities who have either a learning difficulty or mental health problem. They will work within their own communities, offering taster sessions, building into an integrated programme of workshops with their usual client group. This is a two year pilot and 50 individuals will benefit each year.</p>			

<b>Multi Cultural Family Base</b>			<b>£74,801</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£34,562</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£40,239</b>
<p>Based in Edinburgh the organisation provides direct support services to ethnic minority families through a range of services. This project will promote the integration of children and young people from ethnic minorities into mainstream services and society. 45 children in upper primary and another 140 in secondary schools will benefit with an emphasis on children of migrant workers who are facing issues around language and integration. Multi Cultural Family Base will recruit a dedicated worker to drive it forward and will work in partnership with the English as an Additional Language (EAL) Service who will facilitate contacts with schools and provide bilingual support. The programme of work will include consultation programmes with young people, group work and forums aimed at reducing the barriers to integration to out of school activities and supporting them in being further involved in out of school activities.</p>			

<b>Minority Ethnic Careres of Older People Project (MECOPP)</b>			<b>£100,000</b>

<p>MECOPP will utilise their skills and experience to develop a National Development Project which aims to support local carers from minority ethnic communities through highlighting with health boards where their services are not meeting the needs of this client group. Project staff will work alongside health board staff in identifying gaps in service and providing advice on how to meet service needs and another important aim of the project is to drive up public sector performance around supporting minority groups and effecting change. The project will support two local authority health boards, one rural and one urban per year and generic support on a Scottish-wide basis throughout. Assistance will also be provided to black and minority ethnic carers and service users.</p>			

<b>Edinburgh &amp; Lothians Racial Equality Council</b>			<b>£66,005</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£32,514</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£33,491</b>
<p>This funding will be used to develop a black and minority ethnic young persons drop-in facility in Central Edinburgh. Operating on two days per week the project has been designed and is largely run by the young people who have a safe and stimulating facility where they can meet and be young people in a safe and non threatening environment. Staff are on hand to provide backup, advice and information and provide mechanisms to support disclosure. 100 young people between 14 and 21 will benefit through peer support, the opportunity to enjoy each others company and through opportunities to integrate with mainstream services and opportunities e.g. integration with Police and other statutory services.</p>			

<b>Planning Aid for Scotland</b>			<b>£93,353</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£43,796</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£49,557</b>
<p>Planning Aid Scotland (PAS) provides independent advice, training and support in all planning and environmental matters for citizens and community groups in Scotland. This project is called Reach Out and is a community engagement project aimed at identifying barriers to ethnic minority communities and gypsy travellers in participating in planning processes. The project will then undertake an engagement process designed to empower communities to be better skilled in participation. The project will be delivered in partnership with BEMIS and The Travellers Education Information Project North East (TEIP). 900 people will benefit from the project which will be piloted in Highland, Dundee, Fife, Lothians and Glasgow. Communities include North African (Glasgow), Asian Women (Highland), Gypsy Travellers (Dundee), Asian Youth (Edinburgh), Chinese (Glasgow).</p>			

<b>YWCA Roundabout Centre</b>			<b>£9,712</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£9,712</b>		
<p>Based in Central Edinburgh, the Roundabout Centre works to promote good community relations between people of different ethnic and cultural backgrounds as well as empower women to develop their potential. This project will allow the YWCA to work with young women on developing an anti-racist peer education programme which they will then go on to use in challenging racist behaviour with their peer groups. The YWCA has already been working with this group of women through a six month inter-cultural pilot funded by the Community Safety Unit. The funding will not only develop the peer resource pack and deliver the sessions, but continue this support work with the young women. The funding will be used to pay for youth workers, running costs, volunteer expenses and materials. 20 young women will benefit from the project</p>			

<b>Duncholgan Playgroup</b>			<b>£18,622</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£11,082</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£7,540</b>
<p>Duncholgan Playgroup was established 23 years ago for the parents and children of Gypsy/Travellers living on a small site in mid-Argyll. Using a new portacabin as a base, the project will develop an after-school club for the children of Gypsy/Travellers and a range of outreach services to support Gypsy/Travellers parents and families. The project will employ three sessional staff and will purchase equipment for the after school club. 12 children and 24 adults will benefit from the project.</p>			

<b>Ethnic Minorities Law Centre</b>			<b>£100,000</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£50,000</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£50,000</b>
<p>The Ethnic Minorities Law Centre is a well established legal organisation in Glasgow and is very well committed to race equality through its legal support to ME communities. This funding will develop a dedicated service for black and ethnic minority youth population in Glasgow as there is no such service at the present. A formal referral system will be set up across Glasgow along with awareness raising to both young people and youth agency staff of young peoples on legal rights, remedies and responsibilities. Aligned to this will be capacity building for partner youth agencies which will further their knowledge and understanding of youth legal rights. 500 people will benefit from this service each year.</p>			

<b>Contact Point in East Dunbartonshire</b>			<b>£26,849</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£14,065</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£12,784</b>
<p>Contact Point empower people with disabilities and their carers to be included in their communities through the provision of specialist information and advice, outreach services, social support, volunteering, equipment loan and representation on committees. This funding will be used to extend their current work with minority ethnic communities through a process of dedicated outreach with minority ethnic communities and community based organisations. The needs of minority ethnic disabled people are similar to mainstream disabled people, but work needs to be done in targeting the information and support through existing networks. A part time information worker would be recruited to take this forward. 300 individuals will benefit.</p>			

<b>Save The Children</b>			<b>£88,100</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£48,100</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£40,000</b>
<p>This funding will develop further the important work which Save the Children is undertaking with Gypsy Traveller communities. Working across Edinburgh &amp; the Lothians, Fife &amp; Central Scotland and the Highlands this funding will support a member of staff and sessional workers to develop a programme of awareness raising lead by a team of young people from the Gypsy/Traveller community who will run conferences and other awareness raising events and will develop an educational pack for delivery to education authorities and other organisations seeking to reduce discrimination. 630 individuals will benefit.</p>			

<b>Crossroads Youth and Community Association</b>			<b>£45,822</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£23,036</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£22,786</b>
<p>Crossroads was established in the Gorbals in 1968 and currently it runs services in the Gorbals and Govanhill which are orientated around supporting community members who are facing disadvantage. The funding will be used to meet the diverse needs of the community of Govanhill through providing drop in sessions for information and advice, encouraging uptake of the Third Party Reporting Scheme, running a Welcome Project for new arrivals and running events and workshops with the community which celebrate diversity. A part time Project Worker will be taken on to oversee the project and assist with its delivery. The whole community of Govanhill will ultimately benefit from improved integration and community support. Crossroads will specifically be working with refugees, asylum seekers and people from minority ethnic communities who need support in daily life and support in integration. White Scottish people also use their services. 400 people will benefit.</p>			

<b>Grampian Racial Equality Council</b>			<b>£27,300</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£7,900</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£19,400</b>
<p>As part of its role in tackling racism and race crime, this organisation will utilise the funding to develop an Inter-Community Conflict Prevention and Resolution Project – the first of its kind in Scotland. This will work with children aged between eight and fourteen and their families, where the children will have been involved in delivering racial abuse and harassment. These children will undergo a programme of “short term resolution” through which their behaviour and its impact will be discussed and challenged. Aligned to this longer term resolution work will be implemented. A part time social worker will be recruited to drive this forward. 42 Children will benefit over the two year project.</p>			

<b>Gorbals Initiative</b>			<b>£52,292</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£22,033</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£30,259</b>
<p>The Initiative is developing a multi partnership youth work programme called Dare to be Different Active Futures. This will work with 288 young people from across the south side of Glasgow in a programme of capacity building and health living development utilising a defined programme of outward bound activities. A wide range of youth organisations will refer groups of young people to the programme and the participants will include young people with disabilities and a dedicated programme for young women. All programmes will have 50% participants from ethnic minorities. Other match funders include the Big Lottery and NHS Greater Glasgow. This funding will contribute towards the core staff posts within the project , a full time Integration Case Worker and a part time Link Worker. 288 young people – 144 white, 144 from black and minority ethnic communities will benefit.</p>			

<b>Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre</b>			<b>£56,356</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£26,608</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£29,748</b>
<p>AMINA is a well established, women-led organisation that provides direct services to Muslim women. They have identified an unmet need for bereavement support within the communities they work with. This project will be delivered in partnership with CRUSE Bereavement Care and will build the capacity of both AMINA and CRUSE to support bereaved individuals from the Muslim community who currently have no sources of support. The funding will be used to recruit a part-time Development Worker to organise and facilitate training across the two agencies and to develop a resource pack of training materials on Muslim faith and cultural issues that can be used by other agencies as well as by the partner agencies. The project would also build in on enhanced capacity for professional supervision for volunteer counsellors in AMINA through CRUSE's networks, enabling AMINA to increase their pool of volunteer counsellors. Around 100 individuals will benefit from this service.</p>			

<b>Glasgow Ansar (ALL Nations Sport &amp; Recreation)</b>			<b>£85,080</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£42,540</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£42,540</b>
<p>This is a partnership application from three organisations. Glasgow Ansar was formed in 2001 to provide sports opportunities for Muslim young people from Glasgow South side. Since then it has grown rapidly, with a membership of over 200 (young people and adults). Glasgow Maccabi is a long established Jewish organisation providing sports and leisure opportunities. Bellshill Athletic is a junior football club in North Lanarkshire with players predominantly from protestant and catholic communities. The group aims to engage young people in football while promoting racial and religious diversity .The project aims to combat racism and foster integration by bringing together Muslim, Jews, Protestants and Catholics in a football fitness/health programme at Hampden Park involving 144 individuals over two years as a vehicle to challenge racist attitudes and build friendships. Participants will take part in workshops and will have a range of inputs from Glasgow Central Mosque, the Synagogue, the Church of Scotland, Nil by Mouth, Show Racism the Red Card and Strathclyde Police. The Scottish National Stadium, and the major football teams in Glasgow are also involved.</p>			

<b>The Hidden Garden</b>			<b>£20,000</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£10,000</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£10,000</b>
<p>The Hidden Gardens is a regeneration initiative in Pollokshields, providing a green space and a community resource. The funding will be used to encourage integration between different communities in Pollokshields through the development of a Community Involvement Programme over two years, involving a range of informal learning and cultural events within The Hidden Gardens. It will also develop a range of volunteering opportunities specifically targeting BEM communities. 800 individuals will benefit.</p>			

<b>Disabled and Carers Information Centre Association</b>			<b>£44,870</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£19,870</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£25,000</b>
<p>Based in Dundee, this Centre will develop a Minority Ethnic Carers and Disabled People Project which would identify and support minority ethnic carers and disabled people through assertive outreach and then develop appropriate support services. The funding will be used to resource the development of this project. Working through community organisations, information points would be established, bespoke emotional support would be provided to individuals and a Carers Support Group set up. Information will be made available in different formats and languages. 100 individuals will benefit.</p>			

<b>Sikh Sanjog</b>			<b>£18,494</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£18,494</b>		
<p>Based in Leith, Sikh Sanjog have been successfully running a single-sex youth group for teenage girls for several years. Building on this trust and strong foundation, Sikh Sanjog will utilise the funding to support the involvement of the young women and families within mainstream youth activities. The project will also encourage their civic participation. 25 girls and their families will benefit.</p>			

<b>Dundee International Women's Centre (DIWC)</b>			<b>£59,736</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£29,511</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£30,225</b>
<p>This project will further develop the work of the Centre and build on existing new developments. Through funding the post of a Diversity Worker there will be increased opportunities for women to access training and activities. A volunteer programme will also be developed further promoting the involvement of women from a range of minority ethnic communities in community life. 180 Women from a range of communities in Dundee will have access to a wider programme of classes and events.</p>			

<b>Central Scotland Racial Equality Council</b>			<b>£50,000</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£25,000</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£25,000</b>
<p>Central Scotland Racial Equality Council (CSREC) is a Race Equality Council in the central belt with over 21 years of track record of working with ME communities and public bodies on race equality. The organisation's mission is to work towards a racism-free central Scotland by giving everyone an equal chance to learn, work and live free from discrimination and prejudice and the fear of racial harassment and violence. The organisations' main activities centre around the above goals and aims and carries out casework to support victims of race crime besides outreach programmes to raise awareness of such issues in the wider community. The funding will assist CSREC to develop work in schools to raise awareness about racism.</p>			

<b>Glasgow ESOL Forum</b>			<b>£69,500</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£32,000</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£37,500</b>
<p>The Forum wish to develop a work based English as a Second Language (ESOL) project. This will deliver ESOL courses at ten work places where staff with ESOL needs are employed. A dedicated project co-ordinator will be recruited to drive this work forward. Tutors will be recruited and employed to deliver the work within the work place. Courses will be eight-ten weeks in duration and accommodate five-twelve learners. 200 adults will benefit as well as a range of employers in Glasgow. The project has arised out of a need to support people from minority ethnic communities in employment in retaining their positions and being able to fully integrate into the workforce.</p>			

<b>Pan African Arts</b>			<b>£ 78,800</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£39,800</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£39,000</b>
<p>Pan African Arts has an impressive track record of developing and delivering arts projects that successfully involve young people from a range of backgrounds. The funding will be used to appoint key staff who would take forward a programme of work with young people across Glasgow including eight Arts Management Courses, Film and TV Production Skills Workshops a Theatre Production on Race Equality issues and a DVD documentary on the project. The aim is not only to promote the involvement and integration of young people in the arts but to encourage representation of people from ethnic minorities in the arts industry in Scotland. Over 1,000 individuals will benefit over the two years.</p>			

<b>Gypsy/Traveller Education and Information Project (North East)</b>			<b>£ 78,796</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£39,008</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£39,788</b>
<p>The funding will be used to develop the strategic role of the Travellers Education and Information Project in providing information, advice, awareness and support to Gypsy Travellers, the settled community, Local Authorities and the Police. The project will reach out to more travellers, continue needs assessments, engage through three Local Authorities, promote culture and history of the travelling community and act as the nerve centre for reporting racist incidents to the Police and secure positive media coverage of Gypsy Travellers. TEIP will use the funding to meet staff costs for the strategic Co-ordinator seven hours per week, Development Worker 25 hours per week and an Administrative Worker for 2.5 hours per week. 200 adult gypsy travellers will benefit.</p>			

<b>REACH Community Health Project</b>				<b>£98,509</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£49,942</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£48,567</b>	
<p>Reach Community Health Project is a Glasgow based voluntary organisation whose aim is to provide culturally sensitive and accessible preventative clinical health information and services to distinct ME communities in the City of Glasgow. The organisation also strives to influence change within mainstream health services to better address the health needs of distinct ME communities.</p> <p>REACH will utilise the funding to develop a National BME Community Health Development Project. The project will be implemented in two phases. The first phase will involve the assessment of the status of health delivery systems available to ME communities within each of the 6 Health Board Areas. This will involve literature review (of existing policies, documents, journals, books); a mapping exercise on BME health services and a second mapping exercise on cultural diversity. The gathered information will be analysed and presented as a report to HBAS and is expected to highlight the state of health services available to the local ME community, research gaps and needs around cultural diversity training for health care professionals providing services to BME communities. The project will also give recommendation to these HBAS.</p> <p>The second phase will mainly be to set up a national BME Health Forum which will meet quarterly and managed by REACH. Then a national health conference will be conducted by REACH aimed at developing an action plan on race equality and finally, a national BME network will be formed which will be producing bulletins.</p>				

<b>Youth Counselling Services Agency</b>				<b>£72,350</b>
<b>Year 1:</b>	<b>£36,175</b>	<b>Year 2:</b>	<b>£36,175</b>	
<p>YCSA is a Glasgow based organisation that provides counselling services and additional educational support to young ME people by directly working with schools. The organisation run literacy and numeracy activities, drop in services, recreational activities and vocational support to young ME people. The project will provide counselling services to young ME people in 14 primary schools in Glasgow by addressing problems of bullying, racism, cultural clashes and challenges of transition from primary to secondary levels. It is hoped that a total of 200 young people will benefit from the project. YCSA currently work in 10 secondary schools in Glasgow around similar issues and will build on its experiences to offer this additional service to primary school young people. The application has evidenced the need for such a project. Schools have approached YCSA to offer such a service and there have been adequate consultations to put together the proposal. The project will recruit one full time counsellor and one part time counsellor to co-ordinate and manage the work.</p>				

<b>Youth Counselling Services Agency</b>			<b>£20,000</b>
